A fictional film set in the alluring world of one of the most stunning scandals to rock our nation, "American Hustle" tells the story of brilliant con man Irving Rosenfeld (Christian Bale), who along with his equally cunning and seductive British partner Sydney Prosser (Amy Adams) is forced to work for rogue FBI agent Richie DiMaso (Bradley Cooper). DiMaso pushes them into a world of Jersey powerbrokers and mafia that's as dangerous as it is enchanting.

**Second Friday at the Library
Speaker Cliff Miller, farmer & environmentalist**

Fri, Sep 12, 8pm, at the Rappahannock County Library

The first speaker of the fall season is Cliff Miller, whose family has owned and farmed 845 acres surrounding Sperryville for nearly two hundred years. His talk will be a personal account of the changes he has made in the last 15 years in the way he farms, with the aim of continuing his family's stewardship of this land.

There have been significant changes in the way Miller deals with the Thornton River, which runs through his property, and with the way the fields, livestock, infrastructure, and wildlife are managed. We'll hear about how those changes have evolved, why he made them, how they have worked out and the trade-offs he has balanced.

A question and answer session follows the talk. Miller welcomes dissenting voices, in the hope of a lively and informative discussion.

The talk is free. All are welcome.

RAAC Community Theatre opens its busy fall schedule with "Salt & Pepper" by Santa Fe playwright Robert Benjamin.

" 'Salt & Pepper' is a gently provocative stage play about aging with grace, courage, and humor," says director Patty Hardee. "It consists of seven stories connected in theme, character, language, and action. I think audiences will easily relate to this play. The cast features actors from Rappahannock, Madison, and Culpeper counties."

The scenarios in the play bring characters together in situations both funny and poignant. There's the couple on their awkward first date after meeting in a bereavement group. In another scene, older newlyweds bicker while visiting the first wife's grave. And two friends meet at the Post Office, where waiting for "forever" stamps takes on a deeper meaning.

Playwright Robert Benjamin is a retired research physicist who now devotes his time to writing. "Salt & Pepper" has been produced in Santa Fe and New York. "Robert is working on a sequel that he hopes to have completed by early next year," says Patty. "If 'Salt & Pepper' is well-received here, I hope Robert will let us produce the sequel."

For the children, the play's the thing . . .


This summer a grant to the Child Care and Learning Center (CCLC) from RAAC's Claudia Mitchell Arts Fund allowed 25 school-age theater arts campers to see "The Little Mermaid, Jr" at The Winchester Little Theatre and "Mary Poppins" at the Shenandoah University Summer Music Theater.

These professional performances inspired the kids and helped set the standard for their own live production of "The Frog Princess." The children (pictured at right) built their own sets, developed speaking parts, costumes, and make-up. They performed their play for the children and parents at CCLC.

Meet Ralph Bates, RAAC's new fiscal vice-president

Ralph Bates is RAAC's newly elected fiscal vice-president. He retired and relocated to Huntly about 7 years ago, where he quickly became active in community nonprofit organizations.

In Rappahannock and before joining the RAAC Board in 2013, Ralph served for five years on the RAAC Theatre Committee, was stage manager for three Christmas Plays, and was a narrator in "Under Milkwood." He currently manages the Theatre facility, which has undergone improvements to lighting, heating/cooling, reduction of clutter, and improved storage of costumes. He was on the Board of Belle Meade School and serves currently on the Headwaters Board and Krebsler Fund Advisory Board.

Prior to his move to Rappahannock, Ralph successfully ran his management consulting firm for 30 years from Annandale. Ralph focused on leadership development and coaching, organizational change, and long-term planning with Fortune 500, federal, international, and small business clients.

For five years he closed his business to join an international IT and business consulting firm (AMS) in Fairfax. He became a VP and Chief Learning Officer to build and establish a corporate university in 2000.

From 1964 to 1975 he worked largely with the Peace Corps as a volunteer in Colombia, as a manager/developer of their programs in Costa Rica and later Central America. He also served as a consultant in Latin America under the US Agency for International Development. He has two master's degrees and has been adjunct faculty at American University, Johns Hopkins, and Georgetown.

Ralph is fluent in Spanish, helps his wife Gwen with her gardens, builds and maintains his rock gardens, and is a frequent volunteer for "honey do" items.
