

In 1939, newly created British intelligence agency MI6 recruits Cambridge mathematics alumnus Alan Turing (Benedict Cumberbatch) to crack Nazi codes, including Enigma - which cryptanalysts had thought unbreakable. Turing's team, including Joan Clarke (Keira Knightley), analyzes Enigma messages while he builds a machine to decipher them. Turing and team finally succeed and become heroes, but in 1952, the quiet genius encounters disgrace when authorities reveal he is gay and send him to prison.

Based on the real life story of legendary cryptanalyst Alan Turing, the film portrays the nail-biting race against time by Turing and his brilliant team of code-breakers at Britain's top-secret Government Code and Cypher School at Bletchley Park during the darkest days of World War II.

In this Pulitzer Prize-winning play, Weller Martin (Andy Platt) and Fonsia Dorsey (Joyce Abell), elderly nursing home residents, strike up an acquaintance. Over a series of games of gin rummy they talk about their families and their lives outside the nursing home. Gradually, each conversation becomes a battle, ruining their brief friendship.

The RAAC production is directed by Mike Mahoney, who also directed Andy and Joyce in the RAAC production of "Driving Miss Daisy" in 2012. PLEASE NOTE: The play contains strong language.

The original production of "The Gin Game," written by Donald Coburn, opened on Broadway in Oct 1977 and ran for 517 performances. It was directed by Mike Nichols and starred the married couple Hume Cronyn and Jessica Tandy.

This acclaimed film chronicles the tumultuous three-month period in 1965, when Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. led a campaign to secure equal voting rights in the face of violent opposition. The epic march from Selma to Montgomery culminated in President Johnson signing the Voting Rights Act of 1965, one of the most significant victories for the civil rights movement. About Scrabble School:


Built in 1921, Scrabble School is one of more than 5,000 schools built across the South thanks to the leadership and beneficence of Sears Roebuck co-founder Julius Rosenwald and the African-American educator and leader Booker T. Washington. So few Rosenwald Schools remain that in 2003 the National Trust for Historic Preservation listed them among America's "most endangered places."



She studied American duet singing and complex harmonies with old time stars Emily Miller and Suzannah Parkgroup (*top photo, front*). Lisa was inspired by her study with Grammy-award-winning Rhiannon Giddens and with opera legend Charlie Williams in vocal technique.
