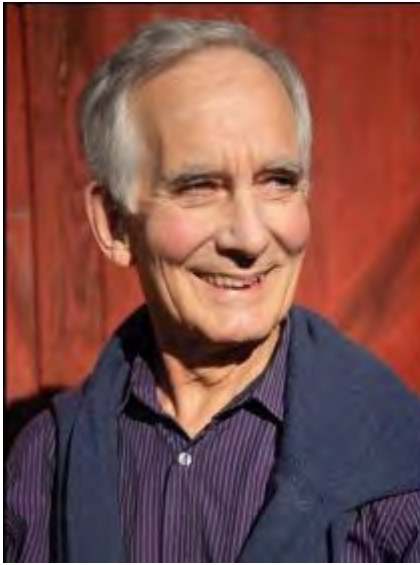

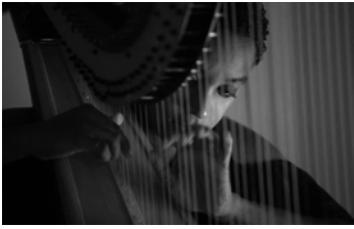
of reading.
